
domesticated plants and farming methods as Kurt Moore presents "Prehistoric Horticulture".


In November, we need each and everyone to come and elect the club officers for 2019. The nominees will have a

## **October Meeting Highlights**

**Dirk Sprenger** announced the final slate of officers to be voted upon at the November meeting.

Alvis Webster and Bob Held reported that all the club's plants have been moved from Chester Honeycutt's property to **Kurt Moore's** except for two plants that will be moved soon. The plants are being grown and maintained for sale at next April's Dogwood Festival in Mebane.

Ray Schwartz presented "Phytoremediation 101" on the use of plants to remove contaminants from water and soil. He covered the various types of contaminants, the dangers of human exposure to contaminants, and plants that are commonly used for remediation. A main takeaway from the presentation was that remediation does not usually destroy contaminants; it just moves them to another system e.g., from soil to trees.
